Learn About **CAR T-Cell Therapy** Clinical Trials



What is CAR T-cell therapy?

CAR T-cell therapy is a type of investigational treatment that uses a person's own immune cells, which are modified and returned to the body, to target certain types of cancer and other diseases.

Unlike many traditional treatments, CAR T-cell investigational therapy is specifically designed for each patient using their own cells.

How does it work?

- 1 Cell Collection**
Doctors collect T cells (a type of white blood cell) from the patient's body.
- 2 Laboratory Training**
The T cells are modified so they can better identify and attack disease-causing cells.
- 3 Return to the Body**
The CAR T-cells are infused back into the patient to help fight the disease.

What are clinical trials?

Clinical trials are carefully supervised medical research studies that help scientists learn about investigational treatment options.

Participating in a clinical trial can contribute to scientific advancement and help improve treatment options for future generations, including our own families.

The Importance of Diverse and Representative Participation

When people from diverse backgrounds participate in clinical trials, researchers can better understand how treatments may affect different populations and help develop therapies that may benefit patients and their families.
